











Mr C. A. Mott, member of the firm of the "Border Morning Mail" who conceived the idea of signalling to the plane with the town's lights by means of a master switch.





A few of the hundreds who manned drag-ropes to haul the "Uiver" to firm ground. The plane is here seen when it became bogged after its first attempt to take off.








Driver R. Jillard, of the 40th (Albury) Battery, who signalled 'Albury' from Monument Hill with a car spotlight and the memorial lighting system.








Flood waters around the Racecourse on morning after the landing.



The "Uiver" has been pulled free of the mud preparatory to taxiing down the ground.






Mr R. F. Turner








Mr Bert Peacock, secretary of the Albury Racing Club, who played an important part in preparing for the landing by marshalling cars round the course in the form of a crescent.








Mr. L. Ferris (Electrical Engineer of Albury Municipal Council) who arranged the town's electricity control apparatus for signalling.
